


Message from the Mayor

Goal of new trustee: keep Village vibrant, with its small-town feel

He grew up, played and worked here. He helped raise his children and volunteered most of his adult life here. On August 26, Scott Adams became the Village's newest Village Board Trustee.

Scott started and managed the Farmer's Market and later became a two-term member of the MainStreet Libertyville Board, serving as chairman for four years. From 1997-2005, Scott served two terms on the District 128 School Board, chairing the property committee. More recently, he served on the executive committee of the

Brainerd Foundation, which attempted to raise funds to transform the old high school building into a community center.

The volunteer work, however, that Scott believes most prepared him for his new role as Trustee was the six years he served on the Village Plan Commission and

Zoning Board of Appeals. (With his move to the Board, another lifelong resident, Amy Flores, has joined those commissions.)

The Planning and Zoning Commissions are great places to learn, Scott said. "In a sense, you do the heavy lifting on the commissions because you hold hearings and make recommendations on issues that then go before the Village Board."

Scott loves the vitality of the community, its diversity, schools, neighborhood feel and the fact that it has a true downtown.

"I want to make sure we are cautious about growth and that ample parking is available for current and potential businesses. I want to keep the Village vibrant and keep its small town feel," he said.

Scott replaced Jim Moran as Trustee. Moran moved just outside the Village limits.



Aggregation users save on their electric bills

Libertyville was one of Illinois' early adopters of an electric aggregation savings program for its residents and small businesses. The program, established in July 2012, has saved participants an average of \$529 on their electric supply over the ComEd rate. Cumulative savings for the Village is more than \$3 million.

The Village previously solicited bids for electricity supply and enacted a savings program with FirstEnergy Solutions whereby ratepayers could achieve savings versus the "default" rate available through ComEd, which acts only as the Provider of Last Resort (or POLR).

Libertyville recently renewed the program with power supplier FirstEnergy Solutions at a rate of 6.54¢ per kWh, a 14% savings versus the current POLR default rate of 7.59¢. Residents and small businesses may enroll for no fee by calling FirstEnergy at 888-651-5200.

Village streets dedicated to honor exemplary residents

For the first time ever, Libertyville dedicated two streets to exemplary residents.

Residents of Dover Court asked the Village to rename their street to honor neighbor, Don Carter. A World War II veteran, Carter volunteers much of his time to American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars projects. He chairs Libertyville's Memorial Day planning committee.

The entry to the main Fire Station on North Milwaukee Avenue was dedicated to long-time Village Trustee and former fireman Bill Madole, who passed away January 7, 2013.
